AREA 6: LANGUAGE OTHER THAN ENGLISH (UC requirement only)

Students transferring to the University of California are required to demonstrate competence (proficiency) in a language other than English equal to two years of high school study. Competence may be satisfied through:

1. Completion of two years of the same foreign language in high school (US high school or high school in country where the language of instruction is English) with grades of "C-" or better;
2. Completion one of the following courses at Cuyamaca College with a grade of "C" (2.0) or better:
 - ARAMAIC 121, 220
 - ARABIC 120, 121, 220, 221
 - AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE 120, 121, 220, 221
 - FRENCH 120, 121, 220, 221
 - ITAL 120, 121, 220
 - KUMEYAAAY 120, 121, 220, 221
 - SPANISH 120, 120B, 121, 220, 221
3. Satisfactory completion, with C grades or better, of two years of formal schooling at the sixth grade level or higher in an institution where the language of instruction is not English. The appropriate documentation such as a letter from the ministry of education must be presented to the evaluation office to substantiate that the required coursework was completed. High school transcripts are not acceptable unless they clearly state that the two years of instruction were done in the student's native language other than English. Students who cannot provide such documentation should either pass one of the examinations or tests listed below in 4 through 7, or satisfactorily complete an appropriate language course at their college, as outlined in 2 above.
4. Satisfactory score on the SAT II: Subject Test in languages other than English. See evaluator or Articulation Officer for necessary scores.
5. Satisfactory score, 3 or higher, in the College Board Advanced Placement Examinations in languages other than English.
6. Satisfactory score, 5 or higher, in the International Baccalaureate Higher Level Examinations in language other than English.
7. Satisfactory completion of an achievement test administered by a community college, university, or other college in a language other than English. The test must assess the student's proficiency at the level equivalent to two year of high school language. This conclusion must be posted on a transcript indicating unit, course title and grade or on a document with letterhead of the institution granting proficiency.
8. If #7 is not available, a faculty member associated with a US regionally accredited institution of higher education can verify a student's competency. The institution must provide a document on letterhead asserting that the student has mastered proficiency in the language equivalent to two years of high school study.
9. Language other than English "O" level exam with grade of "A", "B" or "C".
10. Language other than English International "A" Level exam with a score of 5, 6, or 7.
11. A Defense Language Institute language other than English course which is indicated as passed with a "C" or higher on the official transcript.

US HISTORY, CONSTITUTION AND AMERICAN IDEALS

All undergraduate degree programs require study in U.S. History, Constitution And American Ideals, often referred to as American Institutions. This is **not** an admission but a graduation requirement.

CSU requirement

CSU students meet this requirement by completing two courses (6 units) at Cuyamaca College from one of the options listed below. Courses meeting this requirement may also be counted toward certification in general education (CSU GE-Breadth or IGETC).

Option I (Choose one course from A and one course from B):

- A. HIST 108, 114, 118, 122, 130, 180
- B. HIST 109, 115, 119, 123, 131, 181, or POSC 140

Option II (Choose one course from A and one course from B):

- A. POSC 121
- B. HIST 108, 109, 114, 115, 118, 119, 122, 123, 130, 131, 180, 181

UC requirement

UC students meet the American Institutions requirement with a one-year course in U.S. history and government in high school with a grade of "c" or better. This requirement may be met through examination or enrollment in specific courses. Each UC campus decides how its students may meet the requirement.
