

Unit Examination #3: Chapters 14, 15 & 16 (Adolescence)

What are the primary & secondary sex characteristics of adolescence? What problems do teens encounter during this time? Define body image. Explain teen health. What hormones are involved in the process of puberty? What eating disorders appear during this time? What are the major causes of death? What illnesses are frequently seen? Does reproductive development occur earlier in the US in certain cultural groups? What factor is most responsible for menarche in our country? What is secular trend? Who is most satisfied and dissatisfied with their body-image? What are the characteristics of sexually active adolescents? How does heredity contribute to homosexuality?

How is self-esteem affected during this time? What STD's affect teens? Which drugs are they more likely to abuse and why? Who has had sexual intercourse before completing high school? What do most researchers today believe about the causes of one's sexual identity? What are the causes of teen pregnancy and what societal problems occur? Who usually smokes? Why? What are the reasons for binge drinking? What societal problems are associated with binge drinking? Why? Which situations claim the most deaths among teens in the US?

How does the brain develop during these teen years? What is FMO? How does FMO compare to concrete operational thought according to Piaget? Know the moral reasoning stages of L. Kohlberg. What causes anti-social behavior? Who is David Elkind & what is his theory on adolescence? How does parenting affect teens and their behaviors? What is values clarification? What are the dif. types of Hepatitis and how do they affect this group of teens? What is a psychosocial moratorium? Which is the most critical social competence? What is "criminal recidivism?" Define adolescent egocentrism. What is the invincibility factor?
